





For Toddlers:


Play is crucial for early literacy development as it stimulates cognitive and language skills, enhances problem-solving, and nurtures creativity. Through play, children learn to use symbols, explore language, and engage in meaningful communication, all of which are vital for building a strong foundation for reading and writing.



For Pre-Schoolers:

Narrative play is a type of play where children act out different roles and scenarios. Children start engaging in this type of play at around four-years-old. It's an essential aspect of their development as it helps them develop their creativity, imagination, and social skills. Try using finger puppets or figurines to act out some of your child's favorite fairy tales!
